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# **Executive Summary**

Since 1996 the Vermont Council on Rural Development (VCRD) has produced an Annual Rural Summit for state, federal, and partnering organizations to evaluate critical rural issues and devise cross-agency collaborative solutions for them. The Summit is a central element in the VCRD implementation of its mission to help "Vermont Communities develop their capacity to create a prosperous and sustainable future through coordination, collaboration, and the effective use of public and private resources."

More than any previous Summit, the 2001 session focused on developing plans to respond to a single area of critical and immediate policy concern. This year, with the leadership of Governor Howard Dean and his policy staff, the Summit invited participants to take a long view of the housing crisis facing rural Vermont and to partner in the development of practical action steps to answer this challenge. In her opening statement, Secretary of Administration Hoyt asked members of the administration to highlight elements of their budget presentations to her office, which reflect their commitment to Action Steps identified at the Summit to respond to the housing needs of the state.

Held on June 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> at the Basin Harbor Club, The Governor's Rural Summit on Housing began with a broad discussion of the history of the Vermont landscape and community development, led by Jan Albers. Five short presentations then detailed the housing challenges before the state from the perspectives of a leader of homeless services, a housing inspector, a town planner, a non-profit development leader, and a banker. Work sessions followed where Summit participants analyzed how the current housing crisis impacted the work of their agencies or organizations and then worked together to build concrete plans toward solutions to the challenge before the state.

Four Summit Working Groups discriminated between short and long-term strategic responses to the questions at issue, prioritized them, and committed the resources of their agencies or organizations to the tasks identified, occasionally recommending action by other partner agencies, the Governor's office, or the private sector. Among the 28 Action Steps identified, there is some overlap as issues from one area led to recommendations that connected to the needs of another. The complete list is included in this report. At the Governor's request, further prioritization and consolidation of these steps will be undertaken to build a short list of recommendations for action by his office.

VCRD deeply appreciates the leadership of Governor Dean and his staff, and the opening presentations by Lt. Governor Racine, and Kathy Hoyt. The Summit would be impossible except for the commitment of the strong lineup of presenters and facilitators, the fiscal support of the Agency of Transportation, and the dedication of each Summit participant to the progress of rural Vermont.

Most of Vermont's rural housing stock is aging dwellings. What could or should be done to support the rehabilitation of this aging stock while maintaining its affordability? How do we balance rehab needs with the tremendous need for new construction?

## **Housing Summit Presenters**

#### Jan Albers

Jan Albers is the author of *Hands on the Land: A History of the Vermont Landscape*, which examines the natural, environmental and human history of Vermont's landscape. Albers shows that the current Vermont landscape is a result of the sum total of human decisions that have been made about it. She believes that as communities strengthen, so does responsible stewardship of the land.

Ms. Albers received her doctorate in history from Yale University. She has taught at Yale, the University of Sussex, and Middlebury and St. Michael's Colleges in Vermont. She lives in the country outside of Middlebury with her husband and child.

#### Rita Markley

Rita Markley is the Executive Director of the Committee on Temporary Shelter (COTS), an organization that has won national awards and recognition for its innovative strategies to help the homeless. She serves on the board of directors for Housing Vermont and the National Coalition for the Homeless. Rita is a founding member of the Vermont Alliance for Nonprofit Organizations and she served as the first Chair of the statewide Coalition for Homeless Vermonters. She has been an outspoken advocate for those without homes and was recently honored as the Vermonter of the Year by the Burlington Free Press.

#### **Bob Patterson**

Bob Patterson has been employed by the State of Vermont, Department of Labor & Industry, as an Assistant State Fire Marshal for the past 18 years. Mr. Patterson is currently Regional Manager of the Williston Regional Office.

The Fire Prevention Division regulates the State Fire & Building Code, consisting of codes & standards used throughout the US, including plan approval for new projects and inspection of new and existing buildings. Bob has spent considerable time inspecting rental housing.

Bob is certified as a Fire Inspector, Plan Examiner, and Fire Investigator.

#### Lee Krohn

Lee Krohn has served as Planning Director for the Town of Manchester since 1989, and is a past President of the Vermont Planners Association. Formerly, he taught science and language arts at the Greenwood School in Putney, served as Chair of the Putney Planning Commission, and led bicycle tours throughout the USA, Canada, and Alaska. Lee earned

a bachelor's degree from Franklin & Marshall College, a Master's degree in Environmental Management from the Duke University School of Forestry & Environmental Science, graduated with the inaugural class of the Vermont Leadership Institute, and is a member of the American Institute of Certified Planners. Lee has served on several Regional Planning Commissions, the Beginnings Preschool Board, and the Advisory Boards of VINS/Manchester and the Planning Commissioner's Journal. In his "spare time", Lee works as a commercial photographer, and enjoys bicycle racing and backcountry ski and snowshoe adventures. Lee and his wife Sara (an accomplished pianist, educator, and composer) live in Manchester with their daughter, Alexandra, their two cats, and a spirited dog named Lila.

#### **Andrew Broderick**

Andrew Broderick is President of Housing Vermont, a statewide not-for-profit formed in 1988 to develop and syndicate Low Income Housing Tax Credit housing projects in partnership with local housing non-profits. Housing Vermont has completed development of 72 affordable housing rental properties totaling 2,375 units. Mr. Broderick joined Housing Vermont in 1996 serving as Vice President for Development for 4 years.

Mr. Broderick was previously employed as the Executive Director of the Rockingham Area Community Land Trust, a community-based non-profit housing corporation, where he led in the development of 140 units of rental and single-family housing, a community resource center, a teen center, the redevelopment of a mobile home park, and a 7-town housing rehabilitation loan program.

Mr. Broderick is a member of the board of the Burlington Community Land Trust and is past chair of the Affordable Housing Advisory Council of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Boston. He has also served on the board of Housing Vermont and Parks Place Community Center. He is an attorney.

#### Richard C. White

Since 1986, Richard White has been the President, C.E.O. and Chairman of the Board of the Community National Bank. A retired naval officer, Mr. White practiced law in Vermont for many years before joining the bank. He is a member of the Board of Directors of several state and national banking associations and has a long history of service to regional and statewide economic development and human service projects. He currently serves on the boards of the Vermont Community Foundation, Northern Communities Investment Corporation, the University of Vermont Council of Community Advisors, and Derby Line "Take Charge". Mr. White also works as President of Gilman Housing Trust, a regional developer of affordable housing for the Northeast Kingdom. Married with two children, Mr. White enjoys racquetball, sailing and fishing, as time permits.
