Welcome to the Vermont Council on Rural Development 2011 Report

In the spring of 2009, VCRD published the conclusions of the Council on the Future of Vermont: *Imagining Vermont: Values and Vision for the Future*. This marked the completion of a two-year long project, maybe the most extensive evaluation of public values and priorities that has ever been conducted in the history of the state. *Imagining Vermont* documented the neighborliness and dedication to community that Vermonters have shown so powerfully in this past year in response to the Spring flooding, and especially in their courageous action during and after Hurricane Irene. That strength provides a foundation for optimism about the future vitality of rural Vermont communities.

At VCRD *Imagining Vermont* is a living document, a springboard to action, and a foundation for our work plan—in 2011 and for the next five years. In it Vermonters call for leadership to preserve and protect the working landscape and to advance the state as a center for innovation and green entrepreneurship—a place that creatively tests new ideas.

At VCRD we are dedicated to service to rural Vermont communities. We're designed to serve in two ways: first, as community organizers that help residents set priorities and line up for practical action for town improvement or revitalization. Second, as a neutral facilitator of policy dialogues focused on helping state, federal, non-profit, regional, business and congressional leadership work more effectively to address fundamental challenges and opportunities facing rural Vermont communities. In line with this mission and the charge we have from the Council on the Future of Vermont, VCRD has led dynamic programs in the last year to:

- Help Morrisville set core priorities and organize toward building a food coop, improving trails and walkways, revitalize empty buildings and incubate new businesses.
- Help the Shumlin administration and key partners plan ways to advance Vermont's innovative green economy.
- Complete the plan of the Vermont Working Landscape Council, build the Working Landscape Partnership and Coalition, and frame ideas for a Vermont Working Lands Enterprise Fund for Legislative and Gubernatorial action.
- Lead the e-Vermont Community Broadband Project providing on-line services to 24 rural communities including Front Porch Forum, 1:1 computing in schools, website development, business counseling, WiFi zone development and others.
- Serve as a lead facilitator for key conversations in Vermont ranging from food systems development, to food safety and security, green workforce development, and the future of education.

Through the Council on the Future of Vermont we heard about the dedication of Vermonters to the land and to action in the best spirit of democracy and community. We are grateful for the opportunity that we have, and the charge before us as an organization, to promote efficiency in policy development, and effectiveness in community dialogue and action, for the benefit of all Vermonters.

2011 Program Updates

Community Visit Program: Morristown

VCRD has conducted Community Visits in 40 towns to engage people, evaluate critical challenges, prioritize goals, set up work teams, and build bridges between local needs and public services and resources. Through the 4 month Community Visit Program, VCRD brings state, federal, private and non-profit leaders to hear the concerns of rural communities. The program fosters local leadership and provides facilitation, planning, and resource development to help towns identify and address their priority needs.

In 2011, VCRD conducted a Community Visit in **Morristown** where over 200 community members participated with support from 36 visiting Resource Team members.

Through the process, Morristown residents identified four key priorities for action and formed task force groups who

have begun work to **Develop a**Morrisville Food Coop and Organize the
Foods Industry; Organize a Business
Incubator; Redevelop Empty Buildings
Downtown; and Improve Trails and
Walkways and Physically Unify the Town
by Building a Pedestrian Bridge.

The Morristown Community Visit report, available on our website at: www.vtrural.org, captures the process and includes the workplan that each

task force has developed. In the months since the Visit, each of the task force groups have been hard at work and are making progress. As they move priorities to action the groups are supported with resources from federal, state, regional, local, non-profit, and business leaders who participated in the process.

In 2012, VCRD will bring the Community Visit program to **Bennington** and **Cabot**. VCRD is working to systematically advance our capacity to provide Community Visits and customized neutral facilitation in support of rural communities in Vermont. We're working today to identify towns to work with in 2013 and beyond and are always glad to have towns nominated by our members, partners and friends!



Community and Economic Development Strategic Support

VCRD is committed to supporting communities who have participated in Council initiatives including the Community Visit Program, Creative Communities Program and e-Vermont Community Broadband Project. These programs compliment many VT Agency of Commerce and Community Development efforts to stimulate vibrant downtowns, create new commercial

ventures and develop sustainable local businesses. Thousands of residents in over 50 towns have benefited from these programs and many request additional facilitation, technical support, and implementation assistance.

In 2011, VCRD has provided strategic advice in follow

up to VCRD community programs and statewide efforts including Fairfield, Killington, Randolph, Rutland, Pownal, Shoreham, Marlboro, Guilford, Richmond and Richford and served as a resource and referral agent in support of numerous community efforts throughout Vermont.

VCRD also provides facilitation support to a number of systematic efforts to advance community and economic development in rural Vermont. In 2011 we led in the design and facilitated the day for the "Vermont Green Partnership's Green Summit" on workforce development at VTC in November. VCRD also led in the statewide education summit produced by the VT School

Boards Association and Superintendent's Association, framing ways to produce community engagement and facilitating a 'town meeting'-style event of evaluating major policy questions around the future of public education in Vermont.

As an active member of **Partners for Rural America**, with a seat on its governing board, VCRD connects with State Rural Development Councils (SRDC) across the country and national leadership on rural issues. With its strong board and workplan, Vermont is seen as a national model of SRDC action.

e-Vermont Community Broadband Program

Online tools can offer significant resources and new opportunities in almost every aspect of our lives. However, many people lack the knowledge or awareness to use these tools to their best advantage. National studies consistently show that lack of familiarity with the Internet is a primary reason why households choose not to subscribe to high speed service as it becomes available. Rural towns have a skills and knowledge gap that allows a digital divide to remain even after broadband infrastructure is built.

In spring of 2010, the Vermont Council on Rural Development launched an ambitious project to help rural towns realize the full potential of the Internet.

The e-Vermont Community Broadband Project works locally to ensure best use of online resources to strengthen everything from education to government to business to community connections. Through e-Vermont and under the leadership of VCRD, seven partner organizations deliver services on the ground in 24 Vermont communities. Community Directors at VCRD coordinate these services and manage a process that engages community members from a range of backgrounds in applying broadband resources to reach local goals.

Since the time of the previous annual report significant progress has been made in deployment of partner resources. For example:

- Digital Wish increased from serving 665 students with their 1:1 computing education to 1,139 as they bring technology and training to classrooms around Vermont; in-school trainings reached almost 1,500.
- Front Porch Forum subscriptions increased from 2,000 to 6,284 households in e-Vermont towns. A quarter of the e-Vermont towns now exceed 50% subscription rates.



- The Vermont Small Business Development
 Center increased its base of e-Vermont business
 clients receiving individual advising services from
 32 to 91.
- The Snelling Center for Government is helping 16 town governments build websites.
- 27 local libraries are receiving equipment for public Internet access.
- The Vermont State Colleges launched the Internet Interns program to place students at local libraries to help patrons' build competence.
- The Vermont State Colleges, VCRD and the Department of Libraries launched the Teaching Internet Basics training program to teach technical and pedagogical skills for working with people new to using the Internet

The Vermont Council on Rural Development also works with leaders in e-Vermont communities to build projects that fall outside of partner services and respond to particular local needs. In 2011, first round towns completed these independently developed projects while second round towns launched their own projects. e-Vermont communities are building wireless Internet zones, online archives for local historic documents, public



Internet access using mobile computer labs, a series of community presentations on online tools in the creative economy, online streaming for public access television stations, and improvements to online farmers' markets.

The Vermont Council on Rural Development is proud to lead this critically important project and bring lessons learned to communities statewide.

Governor's Summit on Green Innovation

In June 2011 VCRD convened the "Governor's Summit on Green Innovation," in collaboration with the new administration of Governor Peter Shumlin, to advance Vermont as a 'Green Innovation State' and to facilitate the development of action steps for work across agencies and organizations to promote green innovation as a driver for the future economic prosperity and environmental health of Vermont. Thirty-five participants (along with sixteen speakers, panelists, facilitators, and staff) attended

the two day session at the Basin Harbor Club in Vergennes. Since then, we worked with the administration to analyze and focus the list of 21 categorical actions the participants put forth into six priorities that are now established as key directions for collaborative action to advance Vermont's green economy.

Working Landscape Partnership

Since its launch in December 2010, the **Vermont Working Landscape Partnership** (VWLP) has grown to 170 organizations and over 470 individuals. The Partnership includes farmers, foresters, businesses, non-profit organizations, state, federal, and local leaders, and others who are active in promoting the vitality of Vermont's farm and forest future. The Partnership has worked to advance the 5-point Action Plan developed by their leadership team, the Working Landscape Council. It proposes systematic ways to support local agriculture and forestry, incubate and attract farm and forest entrepreneurs, build rural jobs, and conserve Vermont's Working Landscape for the next generation.

This major policy effort will advance the working landscape by supporting the businesses that have produced and stewarded that landscape and new innovative enterprise development to advance farm, forest, and value-added development for a new generation.


VCRD convened and facilitated the **Vermont** Working Landscape Council (VWLC), a diverse representation of farmers, foresters, and stakeholders to serve as the leadership team for the VWLP to build the Action Plan which they adopted in September 2011. VCRD then published and distributed 1,000 copies of "Investing in our Farm and Forest Future," which calls for new land use policies and sustained investments in the enterprises that support the productive conservation of working lands. The platform proposes a state investment of \$15,000,000 annually in enterprise development, infrastructure and conservation designed to stimulate farm and forest enterprises and the value chains that build jobs and prosperity for rural Vermont communities.

With the Action Plan as a starting point, we've been rallying partners and supporters across party lines

and throughout the state united in the mission of dramatically driving forward new economic opportunities on the land as a foundation for the next generation of Vermont's working landscape.

VCRD presented the Action Plan to key Administration leaders over the course of the fall. We continue to meet with leaders of state government as well as organizations across the state that can mobilize their membership for implementation as we look toward the legislative session of 2012.


